

Restoring Nature in Laingholm

THE SHINING CUCKOO - PIPIWHARAUROA - CHRYSOCOCCYX



With September comes the spring - and the return of the shining cuckoo after a trans-oceanic flight from the Solomon Islands or the Bismarck Archipelago of northeast Papua New Guinea. The bird is common in New Zealand, not threatened, and yet many people have never seen one. The shining cuckoo prefers dense foliage and so is hard to spot – but their distinctive call echoes across the forest: several, loud, upwardly -slurred whistles, concluding with one downwardly slurred note.

By definition, a cuckoo is a parasitic bird that lays its eggs in other birds' nests. Throughout New Zealand, grey warblers are the foster -parents for the shining cuckoo chicks. The shining cuckoo will remove one egg from the grey warbler's nest and replace it with her own. The grey warbler accepts the new egg,

incubates it and then feeds the chick. As the cuckoo grows, it ejects the grey warblers from the nest and is raised alone by its foster parents. As the grey warbler is New Zealand's most common native bird, this behaviour does not impact their numbers.

Shining cuckoos feed on insects and caterpillars. They even take those that are toxic to other birds – including the caterpillar of the monarch butterfly! The best chance of seeing this bird, with its iridescent green plumage and white underparts with dark bands, is when it is feeding on insects in the open foliage of a kowhai. This is a bird that often flies into windows and is stunned or even killed. Stickers on windows or mobiles hanging in windows will deter this unfortunate behaviour for this bird - and, also, our beloved kereru.

CAN WE HAVE OUR CAT AND "EAT IT TOO"?



Cats are remarkable animals: When they bestow favour by smooching or sitting on your lap, they can 'light up your day'. Scientific studies show that interacting with cats can lower stress, reduce anxiety, and even boost serotonin levels, uplifting mood and mental health. Their contented purrs are not only soothing but are also believed to promote healing. Despite their independent nature, cats possess a quiet attentiveness and quirky intelligence that endears them to many. In Aotearoa New Zealand, the domestic cat stands as a graceful, calming, and cherished companion in countless households.

But like lions and tigers they are true apex predators – skilful killers. In Aotearoa, domestic cats have a significant impact on native bird, reptile and invertebrate populations. Studies have shown that both owned and feral cats are prolific hunters, contributing to the decline of many native species. Unlike ecosystems where native animals evolved alongside mammalian predators, New Zealand's wildlife is particularly vulnerable. A single domestic cat can kill more than 100 native birds per year. One cat was found to have 17 native lizards in its stomach at one time. This predation pressure places a massive strain on vulnerable populations. Many owners believe that their cat is too lazy or too well fed to kill wildlife, but the research shows that in almost all cases this is a misconception.

So how do nature lovers like you and me reconcile cat ownership with conservation? Is it even possible? Being a responsible cat owner in ecologically sensitive areas like ours means keeping your cats indoors at all times. However, if you are unwilling to do that, then it is especially important to keep them indoors at night, when they hunt most actively. Desex your cat to prevent unwanted litters and microchip and register it for identification in case it roams. Use collar-mounted bells or deterrent devices to reduce hunting success. Feed your cat well and provide stimulation at home. But note that these measures do not prevent all kills and some cats are skilled enough to fully negate their effects.



EMERGENCY SOS

As we move out of the winter season, we will see a significant amount of foot traffic in the Waitakere Ranges taking advantage of the beautiful Hillary Trail.

Many of the tracks have had significant improvements completed by Auckland Council. However, over the last few years, we have also seen an increase in the amount of people getting injured requiring emergency support.


Whilst there has been upgrades to cell phone coverage in the area, there are many places that remain black-out areas for cell phone coverage.

One of the key messages we want to share is the ability for many new smartphones to provide an Emergency SOS using satellite technology.

In an emergency, your phone may have the ability to send your location to emergency services or to a person in your contacts.

The information you can send can include your coordinates and a brief description of your emergency. This can be critical in providing emergency services with the right information to respond to you in the quickest way possible.





Our brigade also recently purchased a rescue mule which is a significant asset to our brigade and region.

This allows our crews to safely carry injured persons out to a waiting ambulance or helicopter.

We want to thank The Trusts for providing a grant to purchase this life saving asset. Within 48 hours of operationalising the asset it was deployed in an emergency.

SENIOR FIREFIGHTER TRAINING

We currently have two Qualified Fire Fighters enrolled in the Senior Fire Fighter program. QFF Dan and QFF Ross have become the focus of our current training program which looks to have them lead a crew in certain events.

This also allows our brigade to go right back to basics in our training program. The core skills always warrant a refresher, and this is a fantastic time to refresh on the basic skills of firefighting.

QFF Dan will be taking part in the Senior Fire Fighting course in early 2026.

We also have QFF Paul enrolled in the Emergency Response Driver course in October 2025.

Paul will be taking part in a four-day course based at the Te Hiku Training Centre in Mt Wellington.

The course allows Paul to respond in emergency situations under lights and sirens.


Having recently passed his Pump Operator course, this gives our brigade better coverage in responding to emergency situations.



The brigade is also in the process of having SFF Glen and SFF Neil begin the Station Officers training program. This development opportunity allows Glen and Neil to further develop their leadership skills and making good decisions on the fire ground.

We look forward to seeing our crew members develop on the coming year.

Hi - my name is Duncan Milne and I'm standing for the Portage Licencing Trust in the upcoming local body elections. I want to keep the Trusts but make them better.

I'd like to tell you a little about myself. I've been a Laingholm resident for 30 years, and a member of the Laingholm Volunteer Fire Brigade for more than 20. I'm a mental health nurse by trade, and so I'm under no illusions about how harmful alcohol can be - car crashes, domestic violence, mental health concerns all have a huge impact on our community. But I'm also involved with Titirangi Theatre, where I've been their licencee and qualified Bar Manager for 20 years, so I also understand that a quiet drink with friends can be fine. And both Titirangi Theatre and the Fire Brigade have received grants from the Trusts, to help them do what they do.

So firstly, I believe that we should keep the Trusts. They give back huge sums to our community, and if the Trusts are opened up to competition, that'll be significantly impacted. The supermarkets won't give back, they'll send their profits offshore (as they do now). And you'd also see many

more bottle stores opening, with the social problems we know come with them, and they'd be run by owner-operators with fewer staff and likely less staff training. The Trusts are not perfect, but at least they pay the Living Wage and have really worked on their staff training.

But there is room for improvement. I will work on improving venue quality. I want better food, safer and more welcoming venues, and even tighter alcohol control policies. Trusts venues should be a clean, safe and attractive place to have a meal with friends, without being worried about being accosted by some person who has had too much. I want the Trusts to be really smart about their giving back, making grants where they will do the most good for the people who need them most in our community. And I'm against bottle store proliferation - I won't support any increase in store numbers.

Voter turnout is often low in local body elections, but there are many ways in which your vote can make an immediate difference in our communities (I've given some examples above) - so please take the time to read the booklet and return your voting papers. And if you'd like to keep the Trusts but make them safer and more welcoming, I'd really appreciate your vote.

The Forgotten Suburb

Fifty years ago, cars were very expensive. With no vehicle manufacturing in New Zealand, they had to be imported. Some were brought in in bits and assembled here – but they were still expensive.

So, the one car household was the norm, and that car would be used by the "breadwinner" – usually the man-of-the-house – to get to and from work.

The Laingholm school children were taken to school by bus – even the primary school pupils. With no power steering or power assisted brakes, the skilled drivers managed to negotiate the twists and turns of Laingholm Drive and then could be heard across the valley as they chugged up Victory Road (the only sealed road at that time). After school, the children were taken home again on the regular bus from New Lynn. Each child had a "concession" ticket for ten trips, and the driver would clip this ticket as they boarded the bus. Intermediate and high school children, then as now, had a free ride.

As well as the school buses, there was another much appreciated service. The Titirangi businessmen (does that mean that no women ran businesses in the 1970s?) sponsored a shoppers' bus. The bus left Titirangi at 9.50am, travelled down Huia Rd to Laingholm Drive, on to the Post Office (today's takeaways), up Victory Road and through Woodlands Park and Waima to Titirangi. (Note: There was a similar service for French Bay and South Titirangi). It left for the return trip at 11.30. Plenty of time to do shopping and have a coffee!

Today, the last bus into Laingholm leaves New Lynn at 7.25 in the evening, Monday to Friday and 5.55 pm on Saturday and Sunday. Back in the '70s, there was a bus on Friday evening that left Auckland just after 9 pm. Those were the days of "latenight shopping" – and shops closed for the weekend. This late bus brought the shopworkers, and the late-night shoppers, home to Laingholm.

The buses were similar to the ones in the picture. These are 1950s Bedford buses,

CREAMY KUMARA PASTA

350 Grams Spaghetti Noodles

Cooked Kumara, Broccoli, Cauliflower or any vegetables you want to use up

- 1 Can Evaporated Milk
- 2 Teaspoons Wholegrain Mustard
- 3 Teaspoons Cornflour
- 34 Cup Grated Cheese
- Salt and Pepper to Taste



Cook the noodles and keep hot. Toss the previously cooked vegetables in a bowl to combine. Mix all of the other ingredients together, heat and cook for 1 minute. To plate up, place the noodles on plates, followed by the vegetables and then the sauce. If you want you can sprinkle with more cheese and chopped spring onions.

SWEET AND SOUR YAMS

500 Grams chopped and cooked yams

- 2 Tablespoons Butter or Margarine
- 2 Tablespoons Honey
- 1 Teaspoon Chopped Ginger (fresh or from a jar, or use powdered)
- 1 Tablespoon Vinegar



Melt the butter and sauté the yams. Add the honey and ginger and cook for 2 minutes. Add the vinegar and cook another 2 minutes and they are ready to eat.

LEMON POTATOES

- 4 Large washed potatoes (Chopped) boiled for 8-10 minutes
- ¼ Cup Lemon Juice
- 3 Tablespoons Butter or Margarine
- 1 Teaspoon Curry Powder

Ground Black Pepper

Place potatoes in a lined baking dish. Microwave butter, lemon juice curry powder until butter is melted. Pour over potatoes to coat and bake for 20-30 minutes at 180 degrees fan bake, turning a couple of times. Sprinkle with black pepper and serve.



Laingholm Volunteer Fire Brigade


If you live near the fire station you may have heard a very different-sounding siren wailing away alerting us to calls lately. It's our backup siren which has been brought into use because our main siren suffered a major problem and had to be taken away for repairs. Here it's being brought down from its lofty perch ready to go away. The backup siren (it's actually a siren from a Japanese ambulance) is usually brought into operation during power cuts as it operates off batteries.

We sometime get asked why we use a siren as our main method of alerting our crew. Yes, we have pagers and the call details are also sent to our mobile phones, but we live in an area where coverage for such devices is patchy. Some streets (Warner Park Avenue, for example) have no coverage at all in places. The siren also reassures people who call us out that things are happening and that we will be on our way as soon as possible. We very frequently hear from such folk that they were reassured by hearing the siren's call. We expect that our main siren will be back from the repairers soon.



Thanks to the Trusts Charitable Foundation we now have our own training mannequin. These are specially built for emergency services work and are correctly weighted so that it's just like dragging an adult human. Even more importantly they are ruggedly built to stand up to being dragged about. We will use it for on-station training and also for the fire service competitions we take part in, which is what's taking place here with Station Officer Liam Flynn performing the "rescue"





We certainly get our share of crashes on the winding roads of our area. This one got us out of bed early one morning last month after it came off second best in an argument with the railings near the Lower Nihotupu Dam. The driver had absconded. Another crash during a week day saw us called to Huia Road in what is normally the Titirangi Brigade's patch but they were engaged elsewhere. In such cases our communications centre responds the next closest brigade, which was us .



Pictured here is Becky after putting our Lukas Combi Tool to work at a recent car fire on Huia Road. In this case, she used it to open up the bonnet and boot so we could fully extinguish the fire and make the vehicle safe.

The Combi Tool is part of our hydraulic rescue gear you might know it better as the "Jaws of Life." It's designed to cut through metal and spread apart wreckage, giving us fast access when people are trapped in a vehicle after a crash. On other calls, like this one, it helps us quickly open up tough areas to deal with hidden fire or hazards. It's a powerful piece of kit, but it takes skill and training to use it safely and effectively. That's why our firefighters spend time practising with it, so when

seconds count, we know exactly how to get the job done.

The tool was financed several years ago by The Trusts and donations from local residents. It's battery powered which means it can be got to work almost immediately. It replaced our older equipment which had to be hooked up via hydraulic hoses to a hydraulic pump which was driven by a small engine.



Pony Tales

We have so many amazing club members at Huia Road Horse Club, who look after Paddy and Merlin and are involved in helping HRHC run during our monthly pony rides. As a way to say thank you for all their hard work, members who complete a certain amount of pony care days, pony rides, or working bees get a one-on-one experience with one of the grazer's horses. During this time they might get to learn more about grooming and tacking up, feeding, hoof care, and will definitely get a ride if they want to!

In the weekend, our long-term and awesome members Cara and Hannah had a day with Beau and Tink. Cara is a fantastic pony carer, who comes twice a week. The ponies are always happy to see her, and she is wonderful at working with Merlin, our trickier little guy. Hannah helps out three times a week. She's quickly become a super valuable member of the pony team.

Cara was awesome on Beau. She, being a more experienced rider, had an impressive ride, complete with trotting and even cantering.

Cara has had a chance to ride on most of the horses at the club now. As horse owners, it is so much fun to see how well she is progressing.





Hannah on Tink was equally as impressive. While Tink is not quite up to major rides at the moment, she could offer Hannah a bareback ride. Hannah did great, and her and Tink did weaving through cones, steering through obstacles, and going over the seesaw. There was even some bareback trotting, which was very cool as it is quite a different experience from trotting with a saddle.

Both Cara and Hannah did very well with the horses, and everybody had fun (horses included!). It is great to deal with many different horses, as they all have something unique to offer.

Friends of Whatipu and the beautiful Tara

Friends of Whatipu are a group working to protect our stunning west-Auckland beach and have been working to develop the Campground Green Shed as an educational facility for use by people coming to explore the scientific reserve and surrounding environment.

The facilities being developed make it a great base for talks by interesting people like ornithologists, geologists and historians and it is used as a base for search and rescue operations and as a base for trapping operations, beach cleans, and bird monitoring exercises. It is also the base for the wonderful Auckland Council rangers who supply native plants and help us on our planting and weeding days. Our weeding days are focussed on noxious invasive weeds like the woolly nightshade that is so pervasive in Auckland and so debilitating for respiratory health - especially for children and babies.

The Green Shed is the base for people doing bird counting and other work in the Whatipu Scientific Reserve. Whatipu is a very special place and home to many endangered bird species including the incredible hunter, the Tara or white fronted tern.

Nature has fitted out the Tara with a special forked tail that enables it to manoeuvre with incredible agility in the air as it hunts down shoaling fish at sea or in the sheltered lagoon in Whatipu scientific reserve. They were first recorded in the 1960s, although they will have been there much earlier, breeding at Whatipu as a colony in spring laying their eggs within a few days on a rock adjoining Te Toka Tapu a Kupe (Ninepin Rock).

When they are about 2 years old they begin courtship, where the male offers the female a fish mid-flight and if the female dives and catches the fish, they mate for life! When the colonies go to other places, Tara lay their egg, usually one, all around New Zealand's coast and up rivers but they are seldom found far from the coast.

Like us, they have relatives in Australia who live on Flinders and Cape Barren Islands in Tasmania Australia. And again, like us they go to Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria during winter to catch a bit of warmth and sunshine.

Although they are surprisingly long-lived for a bird at around 18 years, our Tara are **endangered** as cats, ferrets, stoats and rats eat their eggs and chicks. And the adults are seriously put off mating when they are stressed (who wouldn't be!) by being chased for fun by dogs and people who think drones are harmless - they are NOT.

On Saturday 6th September a beautiful painting of a Tara by Celeste Stewe will be unveiled at the Green Shed to Friends of Whatipu as part of the Pest Free Waitakere Ranges Alliance Special Species Spotlight campaign, at an event in The Green Shed at Whatipu. Come along at 2.30pm if you would like to hear about our Tara from expert Darryl Jeffries, and see if your community group would like to use The Green Shed for your next educational opportunity.



Spring has arrived after a very wet winter but it still feels very cold for this wimp and I am finding it very hard to motivate myself to do those early spring chores.

Top of my list is digging in the wintering over plants, followed by preparing the soil for the next crops. With the clay soil in this area, I try to dig in some gypsum along with worm wee, seaweed, compost and a generic fertiliser.

Weeds need to be pulled along with any winter failures. Slugs and snails love this time of year so if you've still got some winter staples such as broccoli, cauliflower and brussel sprouts you will need to deal to them by either the search and squash method or using bait. I've had success this year with broccoli and my other brassicas are finally starting to heart up so they'll be

taking up space I want for other crops.

Beans, peppers, sweet corn and beetroot can be sown or planted now and your seed potatoes should be sprouting nicely ready for planting in deep, well composted soil.

Crops that prefer it to be a bit warmer such as capsicum, chilli and tomatoes and basil can be started off indoors.

Watch for brown rot in fruit trees which can be treated with a fungicide. Most flower seeds can now be sown and September is a good time to spruce up the lawn.



Book Reviews



GEORGE WADSWORTH & IAN JOHNSON

Tomorrow and Tomorrow and Tomorrow by Gabrielle Zevin

This is an intense read but well worth it. It is a story of friendship, romance, love betrayal and gaming.

Sam sees Sadie when getting off a train and they renew acquaintances and we read of how, years before they had first met. They were both interested in gaming. Sadie asks Sam if he is still interested in gaming and gives him a copy of a game she has invented. He and his roommate Marx watch it. The three of them combine to invent games and market them and they do very well. We learn how hard it is to actually make a successful game. As they work together their frailties and ambitions are revealed. Sadie meets Dov and has an affair with him and she gets the engine needed to power what became a successful game. Despite promises he never divorces his wife and eventually she leaves him. Sadie thinks Sam is taking advantage of her gaming expertise. Later Sadie and Marx marry and have a daughter but tragedy strikes. Sadie wonders if she has been wrong about Sam. Underlying all this is that we live in an imperfect world and we need to be loved and connected to each other.

This novel was No. 45 in Whitcoull's 100 best books of the year.

Swirly World Lost at Sea by Andrew Fagan

Wow what an adventure! What an epic undertaking to sail his 5.18 m (16.99 ft) yacht non-stop around the world via the Great Southern Capes a total of 28000 kms, estimated to take 14 months.

He writes entertainingly and frankly about getting his boat prepared, the food he needed, his brush with bureaucracies, and how he mentally coped with the strains of storms, huge seas, too much wind and not enough wind . Then how he coped with disaster and got back to New Zealand after 6300kms sailing.

As well, we become acquainted with the trimaran Physalia (10.9m) which had not been unmoved on its mooring in Little Shoal Bay for 10 years, until one day it mysteriously disappeared,

Then to earn money for his trip he gets a job on the cargo vessel Claymore 11 trading between New Zealand and Mangareva and Pitcairn Islands.

But it is his memoir of the event, how it affected him and the detail of the conditions he endured that make this book xtraordinary.

There are quite a few books around about the tragedy and genocide in Gaza. I mention two in this review. The first is The Killing of Gaza: Reports on a Catastrophe, Gideon Levy (Verso, 2024). The author is an Israeli journalist who has covered the conflict in the Middle East for over 40 years. While the 7 October 2023 massacre by Hamas is a starting point for this book, he covers the modern history of the Gaza conflict by reprinting some of his newspaper columns from mid-2014 to mid-2024. Through these columns, he pivots between what is happening now giving a modern historical context to how the present crisis has built up over the decades. The brutality of the Hamas attack horrified him but he writes "I cannot help but feel a profound shame over what my country is doing to Gaza." The author reports from Israel (journalists are not allowed to enter Gaza) but has numerous individual contacts with those in Gaza and first-hand personal stories from those affected by the conflict from his extensive network. He recalls the 1948 violence against and the displacement of 750,000 Palestinians from their homes and land (called the Nakba); the military occupation of the West Bank and Gaza in the 1967 Six Day War; and the restrictions imposed by the Israeli government on the Gaza from 2007. As can be expected, there is strong criticism of his work particularly from those in Israel as he continues to report on what is going on.

The second book is **Being Jewish After the Destruction of Gaza**, **Peter Beinart (Alfred A. Knopf, 2025)**. The author who is an Israeli American-based academic and journalist. He takes a longer historical view and analysis, drawing on his expertise in Judaism and Israeli and Palestinian history going back to biblical times. He deals with Israeli and US politics in relation to Gaza, the immense suffering and very importantly, the confusion and distortion of any criticism of Israel as being antisemitism. He highlights the selective use and misuse of history and biblical texts particularly by the American Jewish community of which he is a member. Both books delve deeper than most reporting in the media and are written in an easy-to-read style.

The South, Tash Aw (4th Estate, 2025) is a tantalizing story of a smouldering relationship between two boys/young men over one summer with a background of disintegrating families. It takes place in rural south Malaysia where Jay, his parents and two sisters are spending their summer break on a small farm that has been in the family for several generations. The farm is falling apart, maybe symbolic of the family relationships. The farm is managed by Jay's father's half-brother who is the sole and lonely parent of Chuan. Amidst this, Jay and the more worldly Chuan are drawn to each other. Jay is introduced to physical work helping Chuan on the farm, and being part of Chuan's busy social life. Jay can imagine a future being part of Chuan's life but that dream is about to be shattered.... The South is an elegantly written novel where life appears static but in fact a lot is going on. Try it.

Class 12 in "The Cherry Orchard": A tragi-comic masterpiece of world theatre

This year Class 12 (Year 13) have taken on one of the most challenging and beautiful plays of world theatre, Anton Chekhov's *The Cherry Orchard*. Konstantin Stanislavski, directed the first performance of the play in 1904 at the Moscow Art Theatre, a production that angered Chekhov because he felt that Stanislavski had pushed the interpretation too far towards tragedy. Since then, all directors have struggled to find the right emotional balance as the tone and tempo shift moment by moment.

A family are pushed to sell their estate and their beloved cherry orchard as they are beset by forces of social, environmental and political change. The characters whirl around the problem and bring their emotional baggage, colliding, colluding and sometimes briefly and poignantly connecting.

We are pushing the comedy as far as we can, finding the farcical clues in the text and working with the extreme elements in the characters. But Chekhov also demands emotional depth and range as powerful feelings surface and are quickly drowned in the flow of daily existence. Whatever inner lives we lead, life presses on in all its real random craziness and time holds us all to account.

The play raises questions of change, freedom, and destiny that resonate strongly with the Waldorf Steiner philosophy, where art is not simply about performance but is a path towards self-knowledge. The play asks: How do we let go of what has shaped us, and how do we meet what is coming?





Huia's first European settler

On 7th January 1860 an article by "Viator" was published in the New Zealand Herald. He had been on his way to Whatipu when he met a "strange character" by the name of John Wade. "He appeared more Maori than Pakeha," wrote Viator, "surrounded, as he was, by his Maori wife and many half-caste children."

John, an Englishman, married Charlotte (Harata), the daughter, and only survivor of the 11 children, of Wetere Te Kauae, a chief from the Awhitu peninsula. In the late 1830s, Wetere sold 1,000 acres of land near Waiuku to John who found it was insufficient to support his growing family. So he exchanged that block for land at what we now call Little Huia. John had been a mill worker at Parau and, possibly, also Laingholm, so was able to work the kauri on his new block of land to supplement his income as a farmer. He appears in the electoral roll of 1855. He had 6 children – Eliza, John, Laura, Thomas, William and Henry. The Maori called him Hake-a-Marama.

In 1853, the government bought the Hikurangi block, which included the land John and his family occupied. John was finally granted title in April 1862, by which time Harata had died, and he was about 70 years old. He sold his land the following month to Samuel Jackson who, at the end of 1863, sold it to Thomas, Ebenezer and Robert Pierce Gibbons. It was Robert Pierce Gibbons who sold it to Edward Turner in 1889, and it remains in the Turner family to this day. The Huia Private Reserve was established as a private trust in 1939. The trustees are members of the Turner family, and the aim is to preserve this area of land for environmental and sentimental reasons.

There are many descendants of John and Harata and they now live in Mangere, Manukau and Waikato. But their legacy also lives on in Little Huia. The Maori name for the conical

peak at the western end of Huia Bay is "Te kā ā Maki" – meaning "The fire of Maki" – but has been corrupted to "Te Komoki".

Today the peak, which is within the Huia
Private Reserve, is known as "Jackie's Peak" –
Jack being an alternative form of John – and is
named for John Wade. The stream flowing
through Little Huia is the Marama Stream –
referencing John's Maori name.



In the late 1880's as the kauri was finally cut out, Huia settlers turned their attention to farming and selling manuka for industry and the fireplaces of Auckland's homes. Foremost was Mr. Alfred 'Hookey' Hill who was later to become storekeeper, postmaster and J.P. at Huia.

The residence of Mr. Hill was where the main road first touches the shores of Huia Bay. His property extended over the entire eastern side of the valley and up to the highest ridge. His first home and store was a modest one near the present telephone exchange. In 1908 he built a grand, stately house nearby, ('Hills House' which still remains), and across the road from the house, on the seaward side, he built his 'new' store which operated from about 1915 to 1940.



Hill's store and Post Office prospered as road travel increased and became an important place of communication and business.

Our family are now 6th Generation Huian's. We all live very close to one another and have kept our family history alive by reviving the extensive history Alfred and Matilda created. We all were born and

bread in Huia and for me the Huia Store was my first ever job working with Sue and Sovann who were the store owners back in 2003 - 2009 They taught me everything from making coffees to customer service. They shaped who I am and inspired me to continue working hard at such a young age. And just like that 10 years passes - thats when the shop came up for sale. as a family were curious as to how his store was fearing after so many years. What we found was enough to get us to quit our day jobs and start the process of bringing it back to life. The building required extensive work, a complete rewire, new plumbing, a whole new

septic system and major upgrades. We felt in our soul that we needed to do all of this so it could stand for another 160years, and the state that it was in before we purchased it we were surprised it was still able to operate. Now with the store completely signed off to 2025 standards and Huias history all over the walls we can take a breath.

6 Years ago we started our mission to bring Alfreds name back into Huias minds, we begun selling shirts and jumpers with his name on it with the goal to purchase him a headstone which he did not have. We didn't realise doing this we would meet a large number of people who were in fact our family (also related Alfred himself). All of us together managed to fundraise enough money to get Alfred the headstone he has so long waited for. It was a great feeling, we found family and a purpose along the way. From this we were given photos, stories and items that Alfred and his family owned. We were told stories of his 6 sons in the wars, one who was a little naughty and got a write up while serving. And how they all lived their lives. Of His 6 daughters who all grew up to have large families of their own and hand down what their mother taught them.

Alfred was a business man and a very social man, he and Matilda created a one stop shop for those families in Huia who relied on the store for everything. One of my favorite parts of all of this is that the descendants of the Hills, Fletchers, Barrs, Duffs, Hinges, Turners are all still here and are all still friends. Alfred was a part of something that has lasted multiple lifetimes. Friendships that have span over 160 years and the new generations are continuing this.

We have stories of Huias past residents on our walls and we get many many people coming in who have fond memories of growing up in Huia, riding their horses to Alfreds shop, and getting their fresh bread for their mums from here back in the 60s (and eating the warm crusts before walking home, whoops that got them in a little trouble but was apparently worth it). Everyone who speaks of it has a smile on their faces. It makes us very very proud to have started the conversation again and to have given Alfred his shop back while we have been here. I love talking about our history, our past is ingrained in us and so many other people who have had the blessing to call Huia a special place to them. You never know who is going to walk in through those doors but you know there will be a story following

Huia is a dream, we love it here and we know everyone else does too. Its in our heart,

Though we are selling the store so someone else can start their story, we will be staying in the area supporting them and cheering them on. There is no other place we would want to live.




"Goodbye 13, Hello 6 – News from Tātai 6"
